Faculty

Peter V. Sampo, President Emeritus

Ph.D., University of Notre Dame (Political Science)

A.M., University of Notre Dame (Political Science)

A.B., St. Vincent College

Dr. Peter Sampo received his bachelor's degree in political science at St. Vincent College in Latrobe, Pennsylvania. His master's and Ph.D. were obtained at the University of Notre Dame. He has taught at St. Anselm College, where he founded the Department of Political Science; St. Francis College, where he was academic dean; Cardinal Newman College; Thomas More College of Liberal Arts, which he co-founded; and at Magdalen College, now Northeast Catholic College. He co-founded Magdalen College, where he also served as charter president and faculty member, as an attempt to renew Catholic higher education. There he designed a summer program for high school students that has served as a model for similar programs at other colleges. Dr. Sampo has published on St. Thomas More and Niccolò Machiavelli. His scholarly interests are religion and politics, international relations, political theory, and liberal education's continuity and relevance. He is the recipient of many awards, including the Governor's Council of New Hampshire Award, the New England Board of Higher Education Award, the Russel Kirk Paideia Prize presented by CiRCE, and the Notre Dame Exemplary Alumnus Award. He has given numerous speeches across the country on the topic of Catholic higher education.

Mary K. Mumbach

Ph.D., University of Dallas (Literature)

M.A., University of Dallas (English)

B.A., University of Dallas

Dr. Mary Mumbach serves on the faculty of Northeast Catholic College as Professor of Literature, teaching courses such as Southern Literature, the Russian Novel, and Literary Criticism. Dr. Mumbach discovered her passion for literature and liberal education at the University of Dallas, where she took all her degrees, under the mentorship of Dr. Louise Cowan. In order to continue the tradition of liberal education for undergraduates, she co-founded the Thomas More College of Liberal Arts, where she served as dean and Professor of Literature for thirty years. She was a designer of the former academic program there, initiated the Rome semester program, and

designed the Collegiate Summer Program for High School Students. Dr. Mumbach subsequently co-founded The Erasmus Institute of Liberal Arts and served as dean and Professor of Literature there until it became part of Northeast Catholic College. During various summers, Dr. Mumbach has been a seminar leader at the Principals Institute and the Teachers Institute at the Dallas Institute of Humanities and Culture. She has served on the Board of the Fellowship of Catholic Scholars and as a first-tier judge in the Hiatt Prize competition. Dr. Mumbach has published essays on medieval romance, Shakespeare, Faulkner, Flannery O'Connor, and education. She served as a member of the Editorial Advisory Board of *Invitation to the Classics*. In 2011, the CiRCE Institute awarded her the Russell Kirk Paideia Prize for a Lifetime of Cultivating Virtue.

Rev. Roger Boucher

B.A., Holy Apostles Seminary (Philosophy)

M.A., St Paul's School of Theology (Theology)

Father Boucher was born in Rochester, New Hampshire in 1942 and graduated from Spaulding High School in 1960. After attending the University of New Hampshire he taught in the schools of the Diocese of Manchester until he entered Holy Apostles seminary where he received his Bachelor's Degree in Philosophy. Subsequently he enrolled at Catholic University of America and St Paul's School of Theology to receive his Master's degree in Theology. He was ordained priest in 1973 for the Diocese of Worcester and served ten years as Catholic Chaplain and tutor in the Religious History of the American people at Clark University in Worcester, Massachusetts. He then entered the Chaplain Corps of the U.S. Navy and served for twenty years retiring with the rank of Commander. Father has served on missions above the Arctic Circle in Norway, in East Timor (South Pacific), twice in Japan, did three tours with the Marine Corps and was Chaplain to the biggest Coast Guard Base (Kodiak, AK). Other tours included San Diego, Pensacola and Winter Harbor, Maine. His best tour was as Supervisory Chaplain of the U.S.S. Bonhomme Richard, LHD 6 for which he is a Plankowner and built its first on-board chapel. The ship has a Navy crew of 1200 plus a contingent of 2000 Marines. He served in the Arabian Gulf during Operation Desert Storm. Father was awarded 3 Meritorious Service Medals, 4 Navy/Marine Corps Commendation Medals, and the Navy Unit Commendation. After retirement Father established an off-grid farm of organic blueberries while serving in various parishes of the Diocese of Manchester and the Melkite Diocese of Newton. On Sunday, he celebrates the Divine Liturgy in the Byzantine Rite at the local Melkite parish, provides Mass for Northeast Catholic College students, does a weekly sung High Mass in the Extraordinary Form at the college. He has been chaplain at the college for seven years in addition to tutoring in theology, sacraments, scripture and liturgy.

Deborah Harne

B.M.E., University of Southern Mississippi

Mrs. Deborah Harne is the Choir Director at Northeast Catholic College. She directs the All-School Collegiate Choir, Polyphony Choir and Chant Schola. Under her direction, the choirs sing sacred music that span the ages – including Gregorian chant, Renaissance motets, hymnody and motets written by living composers. Debbie received her Bachelor's of Music Education from the University of Southern Mississippi with an emphasis in choral music.

Dr. George A. Harne joined the faculty in 2008 and was elected President in 2011, after two years of service as Academic Dean. During his tenure, he has taught courses in Music, Latin, and the Philosophy and Humanities sequence. Dr. Harne's area of expertise is the history of music, the subject of his graduate studies at the University of Washington and Princeton University. His scholarly interests include the intersection of musical and philosophical thought in the Middle Ages, twentieth-century music, and music in antiquity. He has published scholarly articles on medieval music and popular essays on Catholic education. Thanks to a transformative experience studying the great books at St. John's College, Dr. Harne is also passionate about the tradition of liberal arts education and the importance of music to such an education. Dr. Harne and his wife Debbie entered the Catholic Church on the Feast of Christ the King in 2006 and have been blessed with five children—four daughters and one son. Their home serves as a regular gathering place for students, especially for meetings of the Confraternity of Saint Joseph and the Sodality of Mary.

For the 2019 Collegiate Summer Program, Dr. Mumbach will be teaching the course in Literature, Dr. Sampo the course in Politics, Fr. Boucher the course in Theology, Mrs. Harne the course in Sacred Music, and Dr. Harne the course in Philosophy.

Collegiate Summer Program Policies

Dress Code and Packing List

At Northeast Catholic College we recognize that dress is functional, communicative, and an opportunity for creativity. For these reasons, we ask that summer students dress in a way that is appropriate to the occasion, communicates a sense of one's own dignity, and shows respect to others.

It is a tradition at Northeast Catholic that we dress up a bit for classes. This is one way that we mark their importance. While not trying to take ourselves too seriously, we do recognize the importance of our common enterprise.

In that spirit, we ask students to dress in business casual attire for the classroom and Sunday Mass. Men are expected to wear dress pants and a button up shirt. Women are expected to wear dress pants or modest dresses or skirts (skirts/dresses should be no shorter than the top of the knee). Blouses should have a modest neckline. Jeans and sneakers are not appropriate attire for the classroom and Sunday Mass.

Outside of class, students may wear casual dress. Shorts should be of modest length and tank top straps must be two inches wide. Tights and leggings should not be worn without a skirt. For swimming, we ask that women wear modest one-piece bathing suits or tankinis.

For Classroom and Chapel:

Gentlemen: Dress pants, button-down shirts or polo shirts, and dress shoes (loafers accepted). Please bring a dress shirt for Sunday Mass. Suit jackets and ties are not required.

Ladies: Skirts, dress pants, dresses (skirt hems should reach the knee), dress shirts, blouses, (no tank tops please), and dress shoes or sandals

For All Other Activities:

Gentlemen: Casual pants or jeans, shorts, short sleeved shirts, sweatshirts, jackets, bathing suit/swim-shorts, sneakers, and sandals or flip flops

Ladies: Casual pants/jeans/capris, short-sleeved shirts, tank tops with wide straps (please no spaghetti-strap tank tops), sweatshirts, jackets, shorts of modest length, one-piece swimsuits or tankinis, sneakers and sandals or flip flops

- All students are encouraged to bring a pair of sturdy, closed-toed shoes for recreational activities, as well as several sets of athletic clothing for outdoor activity.
- Due to unpredictable weather, summer students are highly encouraged to bring a sweater/jacket and rain gear.

Laundry

Each residence has a laundry room with coin-operated washers and dryers. Students have access to these machines throughout the program.

For participants who anticipate doing laundry on campus, please bring quarters. It is \$1.00/load to run a washing machine and \$1.00/load to run a drier.

Electronics

Though personal electronic devices can be used for good purposes, just as frequently they disrupt personal relationships and can prevent friendships from forming in the first place. This is particularly true in a program such as the Collegiate Summer Program. For these reasons, students are not allowed to use their cell phones and other personal electronic devices during classes and liturgies. Students are urged in the strongest terms to avoid using them during program activities and to reflect on the effects of their use at other times.

Media

Printed and digital media with obscene or offensive content are not allowed. Students who access the internet on or off campus during the Collegiate Summer Program through any device—including a personal phone, tablet, laptop, etc.—must do so in a way that is consistent with the mission of the College and consistent with Catholic moral teaching.

Devices used inappropriately will be retained by the staff and returned at the end of the Collegiate Summer Program.

Property Damage & Littering

Students who damage college property will be required to make fiscal restitution for the value of repairs and replacements. Littering on campus is prohibited.

Civil Law

Students are to adhere to all local, state and federal laws during their participation in the Collegiate Summer Program. Violations of civil law will include the notification of legal guardians and proper authorities, and the student will be removed from the Program.

Verbal and non-verbal communication

Offensive language, profanity, and lewd or inappropriate gestures are prohibited.

Food

Students may store food in designated areas of the residence halls. We ask that participants refrain from keeping food in the private rooms in the residences.

Inter-visitation

Inter-visitation between men and women in the residence halls is not permitted.

Room and Board

Lodging

The students participating in the Collegiate Summer Program reside in either St. Joseph's Residence for men or St. Mary's Residence for women. Members of the opposite sex are not allowed in either of the residences at any time of the day or night. The residences themselves will remain unlocked from 7:00am to 10:00 pm.

Residential Housing

Students are assigned a room by the program staff. Students may request roommates prior to the start of the session. Any concerns regarding room arrangements during the session should be brought to the attention of the program staff.

Students will be expected to keep their rooms reasonably tidy during the session and clean their rooms and common areas of the residences at the end of the session.

Curfew

Students are expected to be in the residences at 9:45 and lights out will be at 11:00 pm. Due to a busy program schedule, it is strongly recommended that students use this allocated time for rest.

Meals

Meal costs are covered by the registration fee. Except for the cookouts and off-campus meals, all meals will be served in the Dining Room in St. Paul's. Meals for off campus events will be provided.

Getting to Northeast Catholic College

If you haven't already, please provide the College with your travel plans and itinerary as soon as possible.

Please note that the timeframe for arrival on the first day of the program is between 12pm and 4pm. If you will be arriving by plane or bus, please note the nominal \$10 fee (each way) for our shuttle service from either the Manchester airport or the Concord bus station to the college. This should be paid upon arrival in the form of cash or check.

Plane

If you are flying into Manchester-Boston Regional Airport in Manchester, NH, please note that there will be several shuttles on the day of arrival (Sunday) between the hours of 12pm and 4pm.

NOTE: The pick-up location at the Manchester Airport is at the “New Hampshire Information” booth near the baggage claim area. Northeast Catholic College does not provide shuttle service from Logan International Airport in Boston. Participants are responsible for arranging their own travel from Boston to Concord, NH. However, a member of our office is happy to offer advice, so please do not hesitate to contact Ms. Mazel Belt, Dean of students, if you have any travel questions.

Bus travel is quite simple and very safe (as the bus leaves from right outside the airport terminals and goes straight to Concord, NH). It takes approximately 2 hours to travel by bus from Logan Airport to Concord, NH, so your flight should arrive no later than 2:30 pm on Sunday, in order to be at the Concord bus station before 5pm.

Bus

If you will be arriving by bus (Greyhound or otherwise), please be sure your destination is Concord, NH (Concord bus station/Concord Transportation Center).

Amtrak services Concord, NH, but as there is not a train station in Concord, Amtrak uses a connecting bus service from a nearby train station. Please visit www.amtrak.com for details.

NOTE: The pick-up location at the Concord Bus Station is in the lobby.

The pick-up location for the Manchester bus station is just outside the lobby.

There will be 2 shuttle times (to the Manchester airport and the Concord bus station) on the last day of the program (approximately 12 noon and 3 pm). The program finishes on 2 pm on the last day of the session.

If you are having difficulty finding flights that will allow you to arrive during the above times, please contact a member of our admissions staff prior to booking a flight. We are happy to provide advice!
